Background



- The Women's Health Program was a Medicaid program that transitioned into Texas Women's Health Program January 2013.
- In 2014, the Sunset Advisory Commission recommended HHSC consolidate the women's health care programs in order to improve service and efficiency for clients and providers.


Background



- On July 1, 2016, HHSC consolidated Texas Women's Health Program and Expanded Primary Health Program into a new program fully funded by state general revenue: Healthy Texas Women.
- HTW is an enrollment-based program with a 12-month term of coverage.

Background





Healthy Texas Women



- Women may be eligible for benefits if they:
 - Are age 15 to 44 (Women age 15 to 17 must have parental or legal guardian consent.)
 - Are U.S. citizens or eligible immigrants
 - Have an income at or below 200% Federal Poverty Level
 - Live in Texas
 - Do not have health insurance
 - Are not pregnant



Family Planning Program

- Women and men may be eligible for benefits if they are:
 - A resident of Texas
 - Age 64 or younger
 - At or below 250% of the Federal Poverty Level





Breast and Cervical Cancer Services



- Women may be eligible for benefits if they:
 - Are a resident of Texas
 - Are 18 or older
 - Do not have health insurance
 - Are at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level



Data Background



- Historical data consists of:
 - The number of services a client received
 - Client counts that have not been unduplicated in all programs
 - A duplicated client count for multiple visits in the reporting period

²In FY 2016, HHSC changed methodologies to ensure total client counts are unduplicated across and within programs, with the exception of the Breast and Cervical Cancer Services Program which may contain clients also counted in other programs due to the program nature.

³ Family Planning changed to a new program in August 2016, as the new Healthy Texas Women Program was implemented, however eligibility remained the same.

⁴Expanded Primary Health Care (EPHC) began in FY 2014, and ended August 2016, as the new Healthy Texas Women Program began.

⁵Women's Health was a Medicaid program, and became fully-state funded as Texas Women's Health Program January 2013. It ended June 2016.

⁶Healthy Texas Women began July 2016, as a combination of EPHC and TWHP. It is an enrollment-based program, with a 12-month term of coverage.

⁷Total Clients include both average enrollment (for WHP/TWHP and HTW only) and the total number served. Current data utilizes a methodology that provides unduplicated counts.

Data Background



- In FY 2016, a new methodology was used to find unduplicated client counts across all programs. However, the Breast and Cervical Cancer Services program may contain clients also served in other programs due to nature of the program.
- Current FY 2016-2017 data utilizes a methodology that provides unduplicated counts.



LARC Initiatives



- HHS and DSHS staff currently represent Texas on several national associations and collaboratives working on LARC.
- HHS hosts a bimonthly workgroup meeting with staff, providers and other key stakeholders to discuss billing and reimbursement issues, input on best practices and opportunities to increase LARC awareness and utilization.
